New Training Group in Cambodia

HOPE business training groups began in several villages in Cambodia in 2019 with over 35 women participating. Village savings groups as well as a local microfinance institution funded the women's loans. As COVID-19 spread in Cambodia, the groups suspended their weekly training meetings. During these hard times and the slowing of business activities, the women were able to draw from their savings in order to meet their most critical needs.

As the virus began to settle down, groups resumed meeting. On June 4, our local leaders, Samoeun and Navy, made the 3 hour trip from Phnom Penh to the Prey Veng province to launch a new HOPE business training group there. These 10 women, led by 2 Program Leaders who received training at our Train the Trainer conference in 2018, will be ready to apply for their HOPE loans next month!

HOPE in the Midst of COVID-19

Despite the global upheaval of the past several months, the work of HOPE has continued. It is no surprise to report, of course, that COVID-19 has impacted our groups. In collaboration with our local leaders, we decided to postpone

microloan programs in Tanzania and Cambodia and to extend current loan repayment schedules in Ghana. HOPE sent emergency relief funds to our HOPE women in Tanzania, Ghana, Uganda, and Kenya. Our local leaders used these funds to help meet critical needs by providing food staples and hand sanitizer, organizing soap and mask-making projects, and conducting COVID-19 education. We have been blessed by the reports, photos, and



videos of the many who were mobilized and helped during this crisis.

Tanzania Loans

Under the direction of Alex Samwel, Get HOPE Global is again sending loan funds to Tanzania. At the beginning of March we were preparing to provide loans for 165 women in 11 different training groups. The restrictions caused by COVID-19 caused a delay in the loan process, but businesses are again able to launch. We sent loan money

for 2 groups in June and money for 3 more groups in July. We plan to send funds for the remaining 6 groups by September. We pray that these loans will be a valuable tool to launch and rebuild businesses. We look forward to the possibility of visiting Alex and these loan recipients in July 2021.

Meet Leokabia

Leokabia M has been a widow for more than 15 years. She had responsibility for her 4 children. Her first boy, because of the economic problems, did not have a chance to go to school. Her two daughters also did not get the chance to go to school. Now the last boy is having a problem getting started. He was in class 7, (the last one in elementary school) and was supposed to take the exam so that he could continue to secondary school.

Leokabia sold tomatoes. From one bucket of tomatoes, she was supposed to provide three meals a day for her family. From that one bucket of tomatoes, she was supposed to give them clothes. From that same bucket of tomatoes she was supposed to take care of their health. Things were bad.

Now that we have partnered with Get HOPE Global, this woman joined us. She attended the business classes for 8 weeks and then we gave her a loan. We trained on honesty, on marketing, and how to differentiate her business from others. She did well in the market and from there she started to



generate more income, and then more income. Her business started to change, and after the classes, after the studies, her last boy got selected to join the secondary school. So, from the business training and the improvements in her business, she could supply his school uniform, books and all the requirements for the boy to join the secondary school. Now as we speak, among the four children that this widow has, this last boy has the chance to join secondary school. It was not that the others were not being brave, not because the others were not being good. No, there was just no money to send them to school.

In Tanzania, in Mwanza, from the way we were raised by our parents is that you have to take care of yourself. People can contribute for the wedding ceremony. People can contribute to your birthday. People can contribute for your funeral, but no one can contribute for your education. So, we have been facing a lot of children lacking the opportunity to go to school.

So this is the story of Leokabia.
